

Neurology India: Video

Author Instructions

1. General Information

- 1.1.** All submissions must be original work, not previously posted or published elsewhere.
- 1.2.** If presented in any conference, the same must be mentioned
- 1.3.** All submissions will undergo peer review prior to publication.
- 1.4.** If accepted for publication, the authors will grant permission to the Neurology India to publish and maintain the video article on the Neurology India website.
- 1.5.** All parts of the video article will be copyrighted by the authors or their institution. Before the final acceptance, the video should have a copyright permission of the author or the institution as the case may be. It is ultimate responsibility of the author to ensure that the video does not have conflict of interest. If so, the same must be mentioned.

2. Video file: The video should be of interest to neurosurgeons or neurologist and may include one or more of the following components:

- 2.1. Neurosurgery:** If a video is submitted for Neurology India, it should have the following components
 - 2.1.1. Should be a unique case or of significant teaching value**
 - 2.1.2. Introductory slide:** This should have the name of the procedure followed by names of the authors. The maximum number of authors allowed are upto 5
 - 2.1.3. Radiology:** All the relevant MRI, CT scans etc. should be shown next explaining clearly the pathology and the surgery proposed. Care should be taken not to show the patient's name or identity
 - 2.1.4. Patient positioning:** This should be shown next along with the approach proposed with the flap and skin incision
 - 2.1.5. Surgical technique:** This should be shown next along with all the relevant steps. If required, schematic diagrams may be shown to explain the surgical steps.
 - 2.1.6. Voice over:** There should be clear voice over explaining the surgical steps. To prevent any interruption or pauses, the author is suggested to first write down the transcript and read it out during the video voice recording. The closure technique should also be shown as this is generally neglected.
 - 2.1.7.** At the end, for a 4-5 seconds, the author may show some 5-6 relevant references related to his/ her work.

2.2. Neurology:

2.2.1. All the above points also hold true for Neurology

2.2.2. It may include various diagnostic procedures e.g. ENMG, EEG etc which could be of significant teaching value

2.2.3. It may also include any therapeutic procedures

2.3. **Length:** Video should be between 2 minutes and 10 minutes.

2.4. **Size:** Video file should be **less than 500 MB**.

2.5. **Optional figures:** If you intend to include figures (such as a medical illustration) that were previously published or are copyrighted by someone other than the authors, you will need to obtain written permission from the copyright holder.

3. Text file—Single Word document should be accompanied with every video

3.1. Title page

3.2. **Submission statement:** provide a statement confirming your abstract and video are original, and have not been submitted elsewhere in part or in whole.

3.3. Title must be an exactly same to that given in the video file.

3.4. Author names must be listed in the same order as presented in the video file; each author's name should be followed by his or her highest academic degree(s) and hospital/departmental affiliation(s).

3.5. Corresponding author (usually the senior author) must be designated, with current contact information and email address.

3.6. **Copyright notice.** The publishers retain copyright for the video and accompanying printed matter that appears on the Neurology India website.

4. Submission of files

4.1. **Both the video and text file must be sent to Editor by email or by google drive:**

4.2. The size of the video must not be larger than 1 GB. The publisher will then compress it to the relevant size and place it on the journal website.

4.3. The format of the video must be preferably on mp4.
